People often say that the stars govern their fate but they forget that success or failure is the result of one's own action. If we sow chaff, We cannot reap grain. If we work hard we succeed and success depends on how hard and sincerely we do not work. People who think that the Law of Karma is Supreme may feel that what one is destined to get he will always get whether he strives or not. But experience tells us that rewards and punishment are the direct result of our action and evil deeds never go unpunished. In fact, the Law of Karma in its proper sense, means that fruit of action that we

get is decided by whatever action we did in the past. As Shakespeare has said: The fault, dear Broutus is not in our stars but in ourselves that we are underlings.

**6** Answer the Legal Problem : (any **three**)

- (i) 'A' invites 'B' for a dinner, but fails to serve his dinner. B wants to sue A for breach of contract. Can he do so ?
  - (ii) 'A' a man enfeebled by disease or age, is induced by B's influence over him as his medical attendant, to agree to pay B an unreasonable sum for his professional services. Is this a contract ? Discuss.
  - (iii) 'X' intends to kill 'A', but the bullet gets stuck upon a strong metal piece of the belt which 'A' is wearing, and thus, 'A' escapes unhurt. Whether 'X' has committed offence?
  - (iv) 'A' intends to steal B's umbrella from the umbrella stand but wrongly takes away C's umbrella. Whether 'A' has committed offence of theft ?
  - (v) A promise to obtain for B an employment in the public service, and B promises to pay 1,000/- rupees to A. Is this a valid contract ? Discuss
  - (vi) 'Z' is carried off by a tiger. A fires at the tiger knowing it to be likely that the shot may kill Z but not intending to kill Z and in good faith intending 'Z's benefit. Whether 'A' has committed offence ?
